Core Concept: Our Lives Are Songs, and Agape Is the Beat

When they do, something transcendent happens: the love becomes mutual.

And in that reciprocity, it becomes true.

Timeless. Eternal.

Agape is not merely an ideal or a feeling. It is the only fundamental, reasonable, essence of being.

And so it follows:

Agape must be the Composer's own essence.
